

THE UPS AND DOWNS OF BELMONT PARK

THEY'VE TAKEN THE cars off the ferris wheel and started re-painting them so that they'll look good when the buyers from the International Association of Amusement Parks come around. They've locked up the arcade booths and junk food concessions. Broken glass, air compressors, and beached plastic whales from Kiddie Land now litter the "funway" between the Scrambler and the Himalayan Carousel. Even "Earthquake," the 75-foot high, 2,800-foot long roller coaster, stands mute against the horizon, somehow ominous in its shroud of silence. Belmont Park, the old-style amusement park at the end of Mission Boulevard, has closed its gates. After 50 years of service to sailors, tourists, and teenyboppers, it has fallen victim to a modern American malady—obsolete by reason of unprofitability.

Belmont Park was not San Diego's first amusement park. On July Fourth, 1911, "Wonderland" opened in Ocean Beach to an assembled throng of 20,000, one-third the population of San Diego. On hand to help celebrate the event were mayors, brass bands, and fireworks displays from Italy. Wonderland had the biggest roller coaster on the West Coast, a giant water slide, boat ride, a Japanese tea garden, a lounge and dance pavilion that could seat 600, and even a menagerie that included bobcats, bears, ostriches, and 100 monkeys.

Wonderland lasted two seasons. In 1913 the Panama-Pacific Exposition in Balboa Park drew the crowds away. The high tide in January, 1916 washed out the sand from under the roller coaster. The ride was closed and the park began a gradual shutdown. The menagerie was moved to Balboa Park where it became part of the new Zoological Garden.

In 1922 the Spreckels Company acquired extensive land holdings on the sand spit known as Mission Beach. Three years later they opened a new amusement park out there on the sand. The Mission Beach Amusement Center (Belmont Park) included a new roller coaster, once again

the largest on the West Coast, and the largest indoor swimming pool. In 1924 the company donated the park to the city via the State Park Commission. They thought it would be a good way to promote real estate and summer rentals in the Mission Beach area. The State Park Commission delayed transfer of the title until 1927, at which point it approved a 10-year lease for the city to run the amusement center.

The city immediately tried to sublease the park to one Ernest Pickering, a concessionaire. But Pickering balked at having to sign a lease that would require spending \$1,200 a year on upkeep. In 1928 Mr. Pickering died. In 1939 the Governor signed a bill releasing all state claims on the park, and the city settled out of court with Mrs. Pickering, who sold her interest in the original lease back to the city for \$10,000. The city then spent an additional \$20,000 to upgrade the park before going out to look for another concessionaire. They decided, however, to keep the "plunge," the larger than olympic-size, heated outdoor swimming pool, under city management. For the rest, they found an endless series of managers willing to run the rides and attractions. The city made the

lease attractive by offering a hefty percentage of the profits (75-85 percent).

Wayne Dillard won a lease in 1940 which he sold to Larry Farley in 1944. Farley stood accused for the scandal of 1945 when Mayor Knox was accused of being the silent partner of tax-avoider tycoon Joe Greco who owned two restaurants at the amusement center, then sold his interest in the park to Warner Austin in 1947. In 1954 James Mitchell and John Ray got hold of the lease. That was also the year that the roller coaster caught fire and had to be closed down.

In 1955 Ray said the city to compel them to make improvements in the park, the city contemplated charging Ray with failure of upkeep. The following year the Grand Jury recommended that the city take control of Belmont Park, but everybody managed to ignore the suggestion and, after agreeing to drop their suits, Ray and the city set down to discuss new ways of raising revenues. One suggestion was to turn the Mission Beach Ballroom into a roller skating rink.

In 1957, unable to make the necessary repairs after three years,

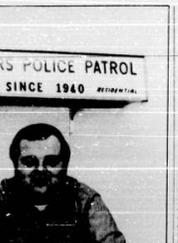

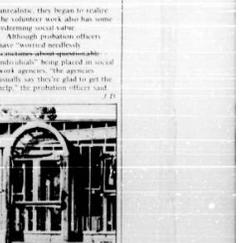

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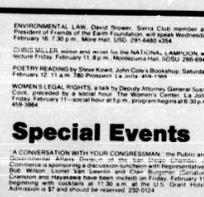
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LUCIANO PAVAROTTI

Disappointment—Italian Style

To see how bizarre, how ritualized, how profoundly mad the folkways of tenor recitals are, one must be either a creature from outer space or a concertgoer who, for one reason or another, feels unable to take part in the general enthusiasm—and much to my dismay the Pavarotti recital placed me firmly in the second category.

going vessel before them loovers its moorings from the mahogany box, contacts itself spasmodically as a huge middle, raises limbs sideways one still grasping the handkerchief as though to embrace the frantic mesh, and goes on repeating those evidently arbitrary actions for some time. There is then a general prostration of the figures on the stage

those thrilling high notes. Pavarotti is a strong lyric tenor, but his voice is consistently lighter, in all registers, than those of the singers I have mentioned. The lower part of his range, lively and expressive as it lacks the depth and power of Caruso (we do speak of dramatic tenors such as Vissi or Melchior), lacks the weight that gives the high Cs of Spontini their majestic, clarion force. So far, Pavarotti has pretty much confined himself to those roles suitable to the lighter tenor voice—the bel canto repertoire of Bellini, Donizetti and Rossini, a few of the lighter Verdi tenor roles, and some Puccini, but on recordings (and only in exceptional cases) has attempted a few of the heavier roles—Il Trovatore, La Gioconda, and the like—without with unqualified success. For a taste of this sort, he is incomparably wonderful, but if you prefer a more robust tenor voice, he is bound to produce a slight but undeniable disappointment.

That I suspect, it was what happened to me at the Civic Theatre last week, and my disappointment was compounded by a fairly dull program of what are essentially recitals, more than a dozen in all, rather than the opera. To demonstrate his greatness as an operatic star, Pavarotti gave us only four roles, rather regrettably ones from the early Verdi, "The furberia burlesca" from Donizetti's "L'Elisir d'Amore" (beautifully sung, and the very brief "Nones such" from Puccini's Turandot (which makes dramatic demands Pavarotti's voice does not quite meet). The only unfamiliar work on the program, and in many ways the most interesting, were two scenes of Tosca on the same program, and an equally compelling interpretation by Pavarotti. I admired this concert, I enjoyed it, but try as I might I was not carried away by it—and I don't even have the excuse of being an extra-terrestrial.

I needed no urging to be enthusiastic at last week's concert of the San Diego Symphony. Conducted by Charles Kitcham, the program featured the young Czech pianist Janina Fialkowska, playing the Chopin's First Concerto—and playing with the passion, the grace, the delicacy and the technical brilliance of one of the great pianists of our time. It may seem excessive to apply these words of praise to a pianist's performance, assuming, of course, that whose ways of walking, talking, eating and enjoying herself do not differentiate her from any other cheerful and healthy woman of her age. But her way of playing the piano clearly and unambiguously differentiates her from virtually all of the young pianists today, for her

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style is enough on the specific points of her interpretation beats an astounding member to that of the master himself, Arthur Schnitzler. Rubinstein has recognized this resemblance to his instrumental in

presence of truly fine music making—an excitement that is an artist's. What I somehow could not feel at the Pavarotti recital, I experienced

in full when watching in Miss Fialkowska, Mr. Kitcham and the San Diego Symphony. They used the work for me, and I thank them

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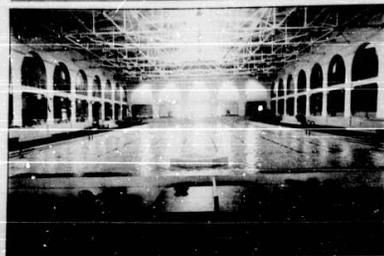

THE PLUNGE

The plunge's exterior may be crumbling, but inside is a pool as lithe and graceful as it always was and as most of its ardent devotees hope it always will be.

Built in 1925, the plunge is renowned either municipally in the northwest corner of Belmont Park and the San Diego Historic Site Board (designated as landmark number 89). There are 115 such landmarks in the city buildings whose structures are judged "architecturally and/or historically significant."

Structurally, the plunge is unique. It is of the same vintage and style as the Organ Pavilion in Balboa Park, "Spanish Renaissance revival" in fact, the exterior of the plunge is a blend of an "imperialist" and a "colonialist" style. The building most resembles the old-fashioned signs of age. Building records reveal that the plunge was built from the grand midday that decorates the three original entrances to the pool (only one is now in use) and the letters "M.B." draped elegantly across the ornate frontispiece are starting to fade.

The plunge's lavish exterior may be crumbling, but inside is a pool as lithe and graceful as it always was and as most of its ardent devotees hope it always will be. Lined off to accommodate eight racing lanes, the huge pool used to be the scene of historic swimmer meets and aquatic pageants. 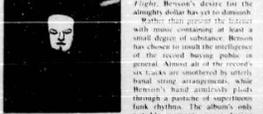

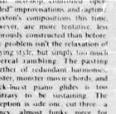

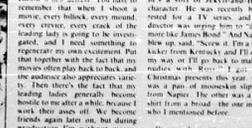
