Introduction

Essential to Point Loma Nazarene University's continued excellence as an institution of higher education is the safety of its staff, faculty, students and guests. Though the University campus is often a peaceful one, situated within an affluent residential neighborhood overlooking the Pacific Ocean, it is not immune to crime. Ensuring that the campus remains a safe place to live, work, and learn requires that all members of the campus community take an active role in safeguarding themselves and others.

The Annual Security Report

The Annual Security Report—prepared by the Department of Public Safety—is intended to provide current and prospective members of the PLNU campus community with important information on campus crime and security that will help them make informed decisions about their own safety. It contains campus crime statistics for the previous three calendar years, based upon reports of crimes to University officials and local law enforcement, and policy statements that comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act.

The report is published online at the Department of Public Safety website each October, at which time an e-mail notification is made by the Director of Public Safety to all students, staff, and faculty members providing a link to electronic copies of the report. Additionally, paper copies are available by request from the Department of Public Safety office.

The Clery Act

In 1990, Congress enacted The Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act as part of an amendment to the Higher Education Act of 1965. Later renamed The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act in memory of Jeanne Clery, a university student murdered in her dorm room, it requires all postsecondary institutions participating in federal student financial assistance programs to disclose certain information on campus crime and various safety and security-related policies. Further amendments in recent years have expanded the requirements to include information on fire safety, sexual assault, and missing students.

The Annual Fire Safety Report

The Clery Act also requires publication of an Annual Fire Safety Report, which includes statistics on campus fires and information on fire prevention, including the types of fire safety systems in each residence hall. The report is prepared by Campus Facilities and made available online each October at <http://www.pointloma.edu/node/2234>. Paper copies may also be requested from the Campus Facilities office.

PLNU Department of Public Safety

The Point Loma Nazarene University Department of Public Safety (hereafter referred to as “DPS”) is a private security organization dedicated to the safety and well-being of the campus community. DPS authority is established by the University President and Board of Trustees. When and if the need arises, DPS officers are authorized to make citizen's arrests, pursuant to California Penal Code 837, of any and all persons creating disturbances against the general peace, interfering with the security of campus facilities or grounds, or interfering with or disturbing the safety and the general welfare of the PLNU community. When such a citizen's arrest is necessary, DPS shall notify the San Diego Police Department, which maintains criminal jurisdiction on campus, in accordance with the law.

DPS officers also have the authority to control access to University property, issue parking permits and citations in accordance with the University Vehicle Code, ask for proof of student or employee status (in the form of a University identification card), and enforce University personal conduct policies. Students engaged in illegal activity or who violate University conduct policies are referred to the Office of the Dean of Students for possible disciplinary action. Staff and faculty engaged in illegal activity or who violate University conduct policies are reported to the Office of Human Resources. Criminal offenses may also be reported to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

DPS is not a law enforcement agency itself and so does not maintain any MOUs with local law enforcement agencies that might clarify roles and responsibilities in the investigation of campus crimes. However, PLNU has signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with eleven higher education law enforcement agencies within the County of San Diego that forms a mutual aid alliance among them. It is intended to establish general guidelines and mutual understanding between these agencies. The objective of this MOU is to collaborate on resources from the various school, college and university law enforcement agencies to improve in the preparation and training for such acts that may disrupt the safety and security of the learning environments these agencies protect. The MOU will encompass the deployment of resources, use of facilities, and incident management system should an unplanned event occur.

Campus Access and Security

The Point Loma campus covers nearly 90 acres in the peninsular suburb of San Diego. It borders a US Navy base, a municipal park, and a residential neighborhood.



The Point Loma campus sits atop a bluff overlooking the Pacific Ocean. It is bordered by a residential neighborhood to the north and east, Sunset Cliffs Park to the west, and a US Naval installation to the south.

Vehicular access to campus is limited to the Lomaland Drive entrance, which is monitored by DPS staff 24 hours a day. Campus guests and visitors must stop and obtain a one-day visitor parking permit, which is to be displayed clearly on the dashboard. Likewise, all students, faculty and staff are required to register their vehicles with the department of Public Safety and to display a valid PLNU parking permit on their windshield. The City of San Diego owns and controls a parking lot to the west of the campus which can only be accessed by vehicles through the University's Lomaland Drive entrance. Visitors who wish to access the City-owned parking lot may do so between 4:00 AM and 10:00 PM, as established by the City of San Diego, though the Lomaland Drive entrance must remain publicly accessible at all times.

In addition to the Lomaland Drive entrance, the campus is accessible from numerous pedestrian pathways and hiking trails that connect to the City-owned parking lot, the adjacent public park, and surrounding residential neighborhoods.

DPS conducts regular security patrols across campus, locks and unlocks classrooms and office areas at scheduled times, and makes reports of safety and security hazards. DPS is responsible for monitoring building access by authorized parties after hours and responds to all building alarms (fire, burglar, etc.) as needed. Several buildings and departmental study rooms are available 24 hours a day by request, for academic use by students, provided that the students meet criteria established in advance by the respective department and are not in violation of other University policies. DPS also maintains emergency phones, building alarms, an electronic access control system, and a networked video surveillance system to aid in the safeguarding of the University.

Campus Facilities maintains the University buildings, grounds, and roadways with a concern for safety and security. They inspect campus facilities regularly, make repairs affecting safety and security, and respond to reports of potential safety and security hazards, such as

broken windows, broken locks, and inadequate lighting. Additionally, the University Safety Committee conducts period assessments of the campus and makes recommendations for safety improvements of structural and environmental conditions.

All members of the campus community are encouraged to report any safety or security hazards in or around campus buildings, grounds, or roadways. Reports may be made to Campus Facilities at (619) 849-2320 during normal business hours or to DPS after hours at (619) 849-2546.

Non-Campus Properties

In support of its undergraduate academic programs, the University also rents, leases, and owns several off-campus properties in the Point Loma and City Heights neighborhoods of San Diego. In Point Loma, the University leases space in Liberty Station—separate from the Liberty Station Conference Center branch campus—for undergraduate art classes and owns and controls an undergraduate student housing facility, known as the Colony Apartments, approximately three miles from the main campus.

In City Heights, the University maintains space devoted to two University programs—the School of Nursing’s student-run Health Promotion Center and the Center for Justice and Reconciliation—as well as an off-campus apartment in support of the Community Classroom program. The Health Promotion Center and the Center for Justice and Reconciliation offices are both located in a building owned by a Nazarene church. DPS does not patrol any of these off-campus properties and Campus Facilities has limited control over the maintenance of these facilities. Crimes occurring at any of these locations are strictly within the jurisdiction of the San Diego Police Department.

Student Housing

Point Loma Nazarene University is a residential campus with nine on-campus residence halls. Undergraduate students are also housed off-campus in Colony Apartments and some participants in the Community Classroom program live together in a University-owned home in City Heights. PLNU does not recognize any student group that maintains its own off-campus housing.

On-campus residence halls are secured and/or monitored 24 hours a day. Access is limited to residents and their guests at times and in a manner determined by the Office of Residential Life. During the winter and spring breaks the residence halls are closed to all students except to those students specially authorized by the Office of Residential Life. Residential Life staff members are off duty during those academic breaks but Public Safety ensures that the buildings remain secure and its officers are available to assist students 24 hours a day.

The University network surveillance system includes cameras that monitor the front entrances to all residence halls except Flex Housing 24 hours a day.

Crime and Incident Reporting

The University strongly encourages victims and witnesses to report all crimes and incidents to DPS, regardless of their nature, as well as to local law enforcement.

Crimes occurring on the PLNU campus or any of its non-campus properties can be reported in person or by calling DPS at (619) 849-2525 at any time. Crimes occurring off the campus should be immediately reported to the San Diego Police Department at (619) 531-2000.

In addition to the reporting of incidents to Public Safety, the following are designated Campus Security Authorities, to which reports can be made. Information from these reports will also be used for the purpose of making timely warnings of criminal offenses as necessary.

- **Director of Public Safety**
- **Vice President for Student Development**
- **Associate Vice President for Student Development**
- **Dean of Students**
- **Director of Community Life**
- **Athletic Director**
- **Coaches**

Policy Statement Addressing Counselors

As a result of the negotiated rulemaking process which followed the signing into law of the amendments to the Clery Act in 1998, clarification was given to those considered to be Campus Security Authorities. Campus “pastoral counselors” and campus “professional counselors,” when acting as such, are not considered to be a Campus Security Authority and are not required to report crimes for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. As a matter of policy, they are encouraged—when they deem it appropriate—to inform persons being counseled of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary basis for inclusion in the annual crime statistics. Pastoral and professional counselors are defined as follows:

- **Pastoral Counselor** – An employee of an institution who is associated with a religious order or denomination, recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides

confidential counseling, and who is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor

- Professional Counselor – An employee of an institution whose official responsibilities include providing psychological counseling to members of the institution’s community, and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification

Confidential Reporting

Anyone may report crimes or suspected crimes anonymously on the DPS website at <http://www.pointloma.edu/publicsafety>. No personally identifying information is required to be submitted along with the report. DPS will investigate all criminal reports obtained through the anonymous reporting system and will include them as necessary in disclosures of crime statistics.

Local Crime Monitoring

DPS obtains some crime statistics from the San Diego Police Department’s E-Watch Notification program for crimes committed within one mile of the Point Loma campus and posts them on the DPS website as they are made available. DPS does not maintain a system, however, for monitoring crimes committed by or perpetrated against PLNU students while off the campus.

Timely Warning Policy

PLNU is responsible for issuing timely warnings in compliance with the Clery Act. Timely warning notifications will be issued to the campus community in response to reported crimes committed or actively occurring on campus property or surrounding public property that—in the judgment of DPS and the University—constitutes a direct or ongoing threat to students, staff and faculty.

Anyone with information believed to warrant a timely warning should promptly report the circumstances to DPS by phone at (619) 849-2525 or in person at the DPS office. DPS will consult, as appropriate and necessary, with other University officials regarding whether a timely warning should be issued. The decision to issue a timely warning shall be made on a case-by-case basis after consideration of the available facts, including factors such as the nature of the crime, the continuing danger or risk to the campus community, and the possible risk of compromising law enforcement efforts. Timely warnings are considered for the following classifications of reported crimes: criminal homicide, sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft and arson. Timely warnings may also be issued for other reported crimes as deemed appropriate under the circumstances. The decision will be made in compliance with the Clery Act and in an effort to prevent similar crimes from occurring.

When a determination is made that a timely warning should be issued, DPS will take appropriate steps to ensure timely notification of the campus community. Options for notification include, but are not limited to, the University’s mass notification system (text messages); campus-wide emails; physical postings on doors and bulletin boards; and the main University, DPS, and University emergency websites. The warnings will include some or all of the following information: the date, time and location of the reported crime; a summary of the incident; a description of the suspect and/or vehicle, if available; and any other special instructions or incident specific safety tips.

To the extent possible, DPS will attempt to withhold any information in the issuance of a timely warning that could be used to identify the victim of the crime. However, some potentially identifying information (e.g., the *exact* location of the crime, a general description of the victim) may need to be released in order to inform members of the campus community in such a way that they can take adequate steps to protect themselves.

Emergencies

Life-threatening emergencies requiring police, fire or medical aid are to be reported to DPS at (619) 849-2525 or by dialing 9-1-1 immediately. Dedicated emergency phones are located in the Parking Structure, in the Young Hall parking lot, outside the DPS office, and in all elevators. These phones connect directly to the DPS dispatcher. DPS personnel will respond to the emergency and contact the proper authorities. All Community Service and Public Safety Officers are trained and certified in first aid, CPR, and AED use.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency Response

For all localized campus emergencies, DPS serves as the primary responder and will contact the appropriate authorities as needed. If an immediate evacuation is necessary, Residential Life personnel will direct the evacuations in residence halls, while staff members serving as volunteer Emergency Response Coordinators (ERCs) direct evacuations in their individual work areas and faculty members do so in classrooms. Designated evacuation routes for each campus building are posted throughout each building. If evacuation is unsafe or not possible, individuals should shelter-in-place.

For large scale emergencies, including fires, hazardous spills, earthquakes, flooding, explosion, and civil disorders, PLNU maintains an Emergency Operations Plan that describes the campus community's plan to address the emergency. The plan is activated by the University President or designated alternate, who is empowered to declare a "state of emergency," whenever there is a threatened or actual condition of disaster or extreme peril which cannot be managed by ordinary campus procedures.

The organizational approach used in the Emergency Operations Plan is one of centralization with the campus subdivided into small emergency response regions. Emergency Response Teams in each region will assess damage and injuries and communicate their findings to the main Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Executive level personnel will then make decisions necessary to direct the campus through its recovery process. The EOC will be staffed with managers from the following operational areas:

- **DPS**
- **Campus Facilities**
- **Residential Life**
- **Media Relations**
- **Human Resources**
- **Sodexo Dining Services**
- **Student Success & Wellness Center**
- **Student Development**
- **ITS**
- **Accounting & Finance**

The EOC is the focal point for information management, decision making, and resource support and allocation during the entire recovery process. Communication links through the EOC will allow direct contact with the Office of the President, County and City Offices of Disaster Preparedness, and the news media.

Emergency Notification

Emergency notifications will be issued to the campus community in response to emergencies that, in the judgment of DPS and the University constitutes a direct or ongoing threat to students, staff, and faculty. DPS will consult, as appropriate and necessary, with administrative cabinet level officials regarding whether an emergency notification should be issued. The decision to issue such a notification shall be made on a case-by-case basis after consideration of the available facts, including factors such as the nature of the emergency and the continuing danger or risk to the campus community. A notification may not be issued in the event of an emergency if doing so risks compromising efforts to assist victims or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

When a determination is made that an emergency notification should be issued, DPS will take appropriate steps to ensure timely notification of the campus community. Options for notification include, but are not limited to, the University's mass notification system (text messages), campus-wide emails, and physical postings on doors and bulletin boards. Information may also be made available on the University's main or emergency website (<http://emergency.pointloma.edu>). The notifications will include some or all of the following information: the location of the emergency situation; a summary of the incident; and any special instructions or incident specific safety tips. When the emergency has ended and no danger to the campus community remains, notification will be made indicating the steps to be taken prior to resuming normal campus operations. Communication with outside news media will be made by the Director of Public Affairs.

Notifications will be made, as appropriate, by one or more of the acting heads of any EOC member department, excluding Sodexo Dining Services.

Testing Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

The Office of Residential Life and DPS jointly conduct unannounced evacuation drills in all residence halls on a biannual basis. Notification is made to the affected portion of the campus community outlining the purpose and objectives of each drill after its completion. Evacuations are timed and the results reviewed by staff.

Two such drills were scheduled and conducted in 2014—one on April 24 and the second on September 9. Each drill was conducted at 9:00pm and lasted approximately 15 minutes. In addition to evacuating the residence halls, in both instances DPS tested the Mass Notification System by sending a simulated emergency text message to all residential students. Emergency radio communication between Residential Life and DPS was also tested.

Drug and Alcohol Policy

PLNU prohibits the manufacture, distribution, possession, dispensation, sale, offer to sell, purchase, and/or use of drugs and/or alcohol on the PLNU campus, at its offsite locations, in areas perceived to be part of the PLNU campus, at any PLNU-sponsored activity, or in the presence of PLNU students at any time.

Some local, state and federal laws establish severe penalties for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol. By state law, the possession of alcohol by anyone less than 21 years of age in a public place or a place open to the public is illegal. It is also unlawful to sell, furnish or provide alcohol to a person under the age of 21. The University reserves the right to refer violations of those state and federal laws concerning alcohol and controlled substances to appropriate civil authorities.

The Staff, Faculty, and Student Handbooks contain all applicable alcohol and drug policies in full, including sanctions for violations.

Substance Abuse Education and Prevention Programs

Point Loma Nazarene University recognizes drug and alcohol dependency as treatable conditions. Students requiring assistance are encouraged to avail themselves of the University's Wellness Center, which provides prevention, referral, and supportive resources, including counseling and health services.

Employees requiring assistance are encouraged to utilize the Employee Assistance Program (EAP), which provides confidential assessment, referral and short-term counseling for employees. The Office of Human Resources is also available to help employees identify appropriate treatment resources and will refer them to treatment or rehabilitation programs, including the EAP.

Weapons

Weapons of any kind are not allowed on campus without prior written permission from the University president. Hand guns, shot guns, air guns, pellet guns, paint guns, rifles, hunting knives, martial arts weapons, dart/blowguns, and fireworks are examples of prohibited weapons. Possession of such weapons is a violation of University policy and will result in referral to the appropriate on-campus authorities. Possession of any unlawful weapon on campus may also result in arrest by local law enforcement.

Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking Policies

Standards of Conduct

Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking are serious violations of law and University policy. In addition, they violate the sanctity of the human body and spirit and will not be tolerated within the Point Loma Nazarene University (PLNU) community.

Definitions

“Sexual assault” means any offense classified as a forcible or non-forcible sex offense under the uniform crime reporting system of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, including rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, forcible fondling, incest and statutory rape.

“Domestic Violence” includes asserted violent misdemeanor and felony offenses committed by the victim’s current or former spouse, current or former cohabitant, person similarly situated under domestic or family violence law, or anyone else protected under domestic or family violence law.

“Dating Violence” means violence by a person who has been in a romantic or intimate relationship with the victim. Whether there was such relationship will be gauged by its length, type, and frequency of interaction.

“Stalking” means a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for her, his, or others’ safety, or to suffer substantial emotional distress.

Following a Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, or Stalking

A victim of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking is strongly encouraged to make a report as soon as possible. Sexual assaults, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking should be reported to the Department of Public Safety at (619) 849-2525, the University Sexual Harassment Officer (Vice President for Student Development) at (619) 849-2479 and/or to the San Diego Police Department at (619) 531-2000. University personnel are required by law to assist victims in contacting the appropriate law enforcement authorities if the victim so chooses, though the victim has a right to decline to notify such authorities. Crimes or suspected crimes can also be reported anonymously on at the following website: <http://www.pointloma.edu/anonymous-incident/crime-reporting>. Victims may also elect to file a disciplinary complaint against the alleged perpetrator using any of the above methods. Timely reporting of sexual assaults is an important part of preventing the commission of similar crimes by the same individual in the future.

Additionally, it is important to preserve evidence as may be necessary to prove criminal sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, or to obtain a protection order. To aid in the prompt and accurate collection of evidence following a sexual assault, it is recommended that the victim not shower, wash, or douche; use the toilet; or change clothes prior to medical examination.

Whether or not an individual makes an official report, he or she is urged to seek appropriate help, which may include medical evaluation, obtaining information, support, and counseling, either on or off campus.

The Wellness Center offers counseling services to undergraduate students who are victims of sexual assaults, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking. Appointments can be made in person or by phoning (619) 849-2574. The Wellness Center is also able to provide referrals for off-campus counseling and health services. The Emergency Rape Crisis Hotline at (888) 385-4657 is staffed by counselors who are specifically trained to help rape victims and to offer confidential support and information about legal, medical and mental health resources.

Victims of alleged sexual assaults, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking may request a change of academic schedule, work, residential living, and transportation situations. The University is legally obligated to grant such requests if the changes are reasonably available regardless of whether or not the victim chooses to report the crime to law enforcement.

The University will make a reasonable effort to accommodate orders of protection, no-contact orders, restraining orders, or similar orders issued by a criminal, civil, or tribal court obtained by victims of sexual assaults, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Once obtained, the victim should provide a copy of the order(s) to a University official.

Additionally, the University will make every effort to protect victim confidentiality, including in its keeping of publicly available records, to the extent permissible by law.

Enforcement

Violation of these Standards and Protocols will result in appropriate legal and/or administrative action, up to and including dismissal from the University. Violation of these standards and protocols also may subject the offender to criminal prosecution or third party civil litigation.

A student alleged to have violated this policy may be subject to the Student Conduct Process as set forth in the Student Handbook, even if the violation occurred off campus. Where an allegation involves a University employee, other relevant administrators will also be involved in and/or oversee the enforcement of these Standards and Protocols.

When situations arise which potentially call for conduct actions, the University will do the following to ensure a prompt, fair, and impartial investigation and resolution:

- Inform the involved parties of the alleged violations of University policy;
- Offer both parties a fair and reasonable opportunity for explanation;
- Interview potential witnesses
- Inform both parties of the outcome of the investigation;
- Provide an avenue of appeal, when appropriate.

In cases of alleged sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking, additional procedures include:

- Proceedings conducted by officials who receive annual training on issues specifically related to the above crimes and on how to conduct proceedings that protect victim safety and promote accountability;
- Both the accuser and accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during proceedings, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice;
- The determination that the alleged offense occurred will be made based upon a preponderance of evidence;
- Both the accuser and the accused will be simultaneously informed in writing of the outcome of the proceedings, the procedures to appeal the results, any subsequent change to the results before they become final, and when such results become final.

At any time, the University may impose such penalties as it concludes are appropriate, ranging from warning to expulsion to termination of employment. Additionally, the University reserves the right to deny re-enrollment to any student if such action is deemed to be in the best interests of the University or the student.

Registered Sex Offenders

California's Megan's Law requires that certain information about sex offenders be made available upon request to members of the public. The California Office of the Attorney General has developed a web site, www.meganslaw.ca.gov, where citizens can review information about registered sex offenders.

Information on registered sex offenders who are students or employees of the University can be obtained at the Office of Admissions and the Office of Human Resources, respectively. No state or federal law prohibits the disclosure of this information.

Victim Disclosure Policy

The University will disclose in writing to the alleged victim of a sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking the outcome of any proceedings conducted by the University against the individual who is the alleged perpetrator of the offense, as well as the procedures to appeal the results, any subsequent change to the results before they become final, and when such results become final. In cases of an alleged violent crime other than sexual assault, or those included in the definitions of domestic violence or dating violence, the University will disclose the outcome to the alleged victim upon written request. In either case, if the alleged victim is deceased as a result of the offense, the results will be provided to the victim's next of kin, if so requested.

Missing Student Notification Policy and Procedure

This policy establishes the procedure to be followed at PLNU in the event an on-campus residential student is reported missing. For the purpose of this policy, a student may be considered missing at any time the student's absence *is* for 24 continuous hours *and* is contrary to his/her usual pattern of behavior. The following is a list of individuals to whom students, employees, or other individuals should report that a student has been missing:

- **Director of Public Safety**
- **Vice President for Student Development**
- **Associate Vice President for Student Development**
- **Dean of Students**
- **Residence Directors**
- **Director of Community Life**
- **Athletic Director**
- **Coaches**

After receiving such a report, the above individuals must immediately notify DPS. When a residential student is reported to be missing, DPS will initiate an investigation into the welfare of the student. Normally a student will not be considered missing until he or she is gone or unaccounted for 24 continuous hours. If there is any indication of foul play or if the absence is contrary to the usual pattern of behavior of the student, an investigation may be implemented prior to the 24 hour period.

If the investigation fails to locate the missing student, DPS will contact San Diego Police Department and file a missing person report. San Diego Police Department will take over the investigation.

If the reported missing student is under the age of 18 and is not emancipated, DPS will immediately make a good faith effort to contact the custodial parent or legal guardian (unless they are the reporting party).

Each student at PLNU will be informed and given the opportunity during each semester registration process to designate a confidential emergency contact person. This person will be contacted by PLNU or law enforcement authorities in the event a residential student is determined to have been missing for over 24 hours.

Regardless of whether the missing student has identified an emergency contact person, is above the age of 18 or is an emancipated minor, PLNU will make notification to the San Diego Police Department.

Campus Safety and Security Education Programs

PLNU has a variety of programs in place to educate students, staff, and faculty in matters of safety and security.

DPS provides information about itself and about crime on campus to new students and their parents during the NSO Resource Fair every August. The Director of Public Safety and/or the Dean of Students typically address new students in a group setting at least once during NSO. Topics covered include sexual harassment, personal safety and crime prevention. Human Resources covers similar topics during employee orientation and campus leaders are given a refresher course on sexual harassment and sexual assault annually during “Lead Week.”

Throughout the school year, DPS distributes fliers covering a range of issues (e.g., bicycle theft prevention) and will occasionally send campus-wide emails to highlight specific safety concerns such as travelling to and from Mexico, vehicle and pedestrian safety, and earthquake preparedness.

In cooperation with the Student Success & Wellness Center and local law enforcement agencies, DPS holds an annual one-day anti-drunk driving campaign on campus. DPS also occasionally sponsors personal self-defense seminars.

Campus Crime Statistics

Definitions

Per the Clery Act, the crime statistics contained on the following pages are classified based on the Federal Bureau of Investigation’s *National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)* edition of the *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook (UCR)*, the *Uniform Crime Reporting Hate Crime Data Collection Guidelines*, and *Training Guide for Hate Crime Data Collection*. ‘Disciplinary referral’ is defined as the referral of any person to any official who initiates a formal or informal disciplinary action of which a record is kept and which may result in the imposition of a sanction. Only referrals for violations of applicable drug, alcohol, and weapons laws are counted.

Geographical Definitions

Under definitions set forth in the Clery Act, the ‘on campus’ category for PLNU includes all areas (including residence halls) contained within the University’s property boundaries except the City Lot and City-owned portions of Lomaland Drive. ‘Student housing’ is a subset of the ‘on campus’ category though its statistics are also shown separately. It does not include *off-campus* student housing, such as the Colony Apartments, which are instead included in the statistics for non-campus. Public property includes but is not limited to the City-owned parking lot, Sunset Cliffs Park, and portions of the public streets adjacent to the campus.

Hate Crimes

There were no reported hate crimes in 2012, 2013, and 2014.

Notes on Statistics

1. The sex offense reported in 2012 involved two non-student minors who were attending a hosted event on campus. Information on the allegation was provided by SDPD during their initial investigation. No University student or employee was involved as an alleged victim, perpetrator or witness.

2. In 2013 a student reported to campus authorities that she was being stalked by a fellow student who was a former boyfriend. The perpetrator was expelled as a result of the administrative investigation. In accordance with guidelines issued by the Department of Education, this incident is not counted in the statistics for the campus' Clery geography because the behavior began and primarily occurred off campus where the victim lived.

3. In 2014 a student reported to campus authorities that she was being stalked by an individual with whom she once had a relationship but who was not affiliated with the university. The student reported that in 2013 she was raped off campus and he had been sending her threatening electronic messages ever since. The case was handled by the San Diego County Sheriff, who subsequently confirmed that the suspect was no longer living in San Diego.

*Note: SDPD did not provide statistics for public property as defined by the Clery Act for 2012, 2013, and 2014, but did provide the following statistics for crimes occurring within the same US Census tract as the Point Loma campus. Because the statistics were not broken down geographically, they may include crimes already counted in the on-campus category. If a crime category is not represented below then no crimes of that type were reported:

2014: Murder – 2, Rape – 1, Robbery – 8, Aggravated Assault – 4, Burglary – 9, Motor Vehicle Theft – 2, Drug Arrests – 25, Alcohol Arrests – 50

2013: Aggravated Assault – 4, Burglary – 27, Motor Vehicle Theft – 4, Drug Arrests – 16, Alcohol Arrests – 64, Weapons Arrests – 3.

2012: Robbery – 2, Aggravated Assault – 1, Burglary – 24, Motor Vehicle Theft – 4, Drug Arrests – 11, Alcohol Arrests – 10, Weapons Arrests – 1.

NA = Not Applicable. Domestic violence, dating, violence, and stalking are newly required crime types following amendments made to the Clery Act in April 2013 by the Campus Sexual Violence Elimination (Campus SaVE) provision of the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act. Because the new statutes went into effect in 2014 and because final guidance from the Department of Education on their application was not provided until October 2014, recordkeeping for these crime types prior to that time may be incomplete. However, PLNU has made a good faith effort to comply with the various provisions of the law as interpreted by the Department of Education.
